Anglia Motor Sport Club is Motorsport UK's – Club of the Year 2022



Representatives of Anglia Motor Sport Club were officially honoured at Motorsport UK's esteemed Night of Champions Prize Giving ceremony on Saturday 28 January. The prestigious event takes place annually at the Royal Automobile Club in London, and recognises excellence across the sport.

In December last year, Motorsport UK - the governing body for four-wheel motorsport in the UK - announced Anglia Motor Sport Club (AMSC) as Club of the Year for 2022. SCCON is one of the member clubs within the AMSC. There are over 700 clubs nationwide, however AMSC topped the table with its pioneering efforts to develop new approaches and launch new initiatives to break down barriers throughout the sport.

Club Chairman, Dan Pearson and Club Development Officer, Laura Cooledge were pleased to represent AMSC at Motorsport UK's headline awards ceremony. In attendance alongside the AMSC pair were a number of motorsport greats, including Ron Dennis CBE, Sir Patrick Head, Martin Brundle and Jonathan Palmer.

Chairman of Motorsport UK, David Richards CBE, presented Anglia Motor Sport Club with the shining award, to honour its Club of the Year accolade.

Anglia Motor Sport Club chairman Dan Pearson said:

"It was an incredible evening to be a part of, celebrating the success of many in motorsport. The evening was a great opportunity to build relationships with colleagues in the sport and to work with one another to continue developing grassroots motorsport and ensure it is accessible to all."

Whilst the historic silver trophy presented could not be taken home, a replica will be paraded around as many motorsport events as possible in the coming year to celebrate the Club's achievements. AMSC also received a £1,000 cheque from Motorsport UK as part of its winnings.

Roger Albert Clark Rally - Route outline revealed

The provisional route for this year's Roger Albert Clark Rally has been revealed with the event starting in Carmarthen and finishing in Carlisle five days later.

The November 23-27th event will feature 150 special stage miles not previously used on the rally, as it ventures into new regions of Wales and further into south-west Scotland than ever before. Rally manager Colin Heppenstall unveiled the route outline at the BHRC awards dinner on Saturday 4th February and confirmed five full days of rallying with more than 340 stage miles from Thursday to Monday. The competitive route covers some of the best forest stages in Wales, Scotland and Northumberland before finishing in Carlisle on Monday afternoon.

The rally opens with scrutineering and documentation at Carmarthen Showground on Wednesday, November 22, before a ceremonial start in Guildhall Square in Carmarthen on Wednesday evening. The competitive action begins on Thursday morning (23rd November) with a day of 45 stage miles and service at Walters Arena. Friday will be the first really tough day covering around 80 stage miles as the route ventures further into mid-Wales with service at Sweet Lamb.

The first cars will finish Friday's leg at around 1630hrs and competitors will then complete a transport section to Carlisle where the rally will be based for the remaining three days.

The re-start on Saturday morning will be from H&H Auctions at 0730hrs before over 60 competitive miles in south-west Scotland, with service based in the Newton Stewart area. After another overnight halt at Carlisle, Sunday's action will move into the Kielder complex with nearly 80 competitive miles and service at Kielder Greenside as the route heads eastwards.

Monday will provide a serious sting in the tail with over 80 stage miles, including several long stages, in the central block of Kielder. The first finisher will be due back in Carlisle at 1530 hours.

Heppenstall said: "I'm delighted to unveil our provisional route outline for this year. We are planning 340 miles of forest stages connected by around 850 liaison miles. Importantly, we are expecting to include about 150 miles of stages that have never been used on this event before and we will also be looking carefully at which stages are double used.

"The level of competitor interest at this stage is unprecedented and I know many competitors have been waiting for this information in order to make hotel bookings. We plan to publish the event regulations on February 18 and entries will open on March 1. We will soon publish details of how the entry system will work." The entry fee will be £4900.

To all that helped make this year's rally at Snetterton happen. On behalf of myself, Tony and the whole organising team I would like to say a massive thank-you to you all. We had a great turn-out on Friday to help with the set-up. It was great to see both old and new faces getting involved and helping.

To the Marshals and Radio crews, thank you for turning up to check in and being on post promptly. It helps us massively knowing you have arrived and we have all of the posts covered as early as possible. A special thank you to those who were flexible with moving posts both before and on the day. Out of everyone we were expecting, there were only 3 people that didn't attend which is very much appreciated. In fact, there were a whopping 119 of you out on stage and on time controls, as well as the 20 or so people looking after the paddock, gates, programme sales, fuel area and so on. Without you the rally could not run and we greatly appreciate your support of the event.

There were around 2000 spectators at the event, showing how popular the rally has become. This again is down to all of the marshals, officials and MSV who make the event happen. The paddock marshals were able to manage the competitors and spectators and at the same time sell around 200 programmes which was enough to cover the costs of the programme and turn a small profit. Well done to you all.

The marshals and radio crews submitted 14 incident reports which helped the Clerk of the Course Clive Grounds to issue appropriate penalties, and he passes his personal thanks to you all for your great support of the event and for submitting accurate reports which he believes contributed to the competitors behaving themselves so well in the later stages.

Thank you to everyone who helped clear down the stages during and after the rally. I don't think it has ever been done as quickly and as efficiently. A great improvement after last year's difficulties.

The feedback from competitors and from Snetterton circuit has also been very positive. Our rally was voted championship rally of the year last year and from the feedback given we have only improved.

We truly hope you enjoyed the day and that you'll be back next year. There are several events between now and then which would also greatly appreciate your help. THE ASSOCIATION OF CENTRAL SOUTHERN MOTOR CLUBS ELECTRIC VEHICLES IN MOTOR SPORT

A summary of a discussion about EV's from January's ACSMC Committee Meeting

EV's future for road transport is fairly well understood, and some clubs have accepted entries from them in AutoSOLO and speed events, but as organising clubs are we ready to embrace and encourage this?

One member club had asked all the member clubs of the BTRDA (British Trials and Rally Drivers Association) for their views and some clubs are not keen to encourage EVs and it was reported that there was reluctance from some land-owners. Generally their view was that they were OK in principle to have EVs competing on their land but they wanted much more information, particularly about safety, before they would agree to it.

It was felt that Motorsport UK should be able to help with information about how electric cars have performed safely in motorsport, and can do so in the future, to help discussions with land-owners. There may be different issues between standard electric cars from the major manufacturers and modified or low volume EV's.

Two sprints held at Abingdon had four unmodified Teslas competing. They ran singly and separately from the other cars. Marshals were instructed to have no involvement with the Teslas and the EV drivers had to provide their own support. It was felt that these vehicles are beyond current standards of marshal training and marshal intervention. Except for F1 and WRC (now with Hybrid rally cars) most marshals have not even been trained in how to approach EVs. Unless trained, it has to be an "if in doubt stay out" approach. Some limited training has taken place for rescue crews; generally only one person per crew. It is hoped that Motorsport UK will develop new training for EVs in terms of the vehicles, protocols, safety etc. It was asked "Where is Motorsport UK in terms of taking this forward and are they working on a plan for club-level motor sport?"

It was felt that the ACSMC is a long way from being able to incorporate EVs into their Association's championship structures.

Borough 19 Motor Club has run events in which four Teslas were entered, one of them with uprated motor(s). B19's policy was that in the event of a fire, to keep away and let the vehicle burn. Apparently this is also the current policy of the Fire Service.

But electric cars are here to stay and B19 MC fully intend to invite and encourage EVs to their events. One delegate who was Clerk of the Course for a B19 event said that even cars that seem to be standard EVs may not be as 'standard' as one might expect because some people are playing with things to 'improve' them. Twin motor Teslas are very quick, (and heavy) causing high loading for tyres, wheels and brakes.

Dealing with fires on petrol and diesel is well understood, but nobody wants to encounter an EV fire which may end an event. Another delegate had encountered a 90 minute delay after a 'Mod Prod' car with a smoking battery came to a halt mid-course.

ACSMC's co-chairman was going to ask Motorsport UK how clubs should deal with the situation should an EV be entered in a StreetCar event.

GETTING STARTED IN MOTORSPORT



The chairman of club of the year Anglia Motor Sport Club explains how it is getting new people involved at the grassroots



Club encourages competing and volunteering

nglia Motor Sport Club was established in 2013 to combat the decline in grassroots motorsport. Three individuals from three clubs - the Sporting Car Club of Norfolk, the Eastern Counties Motor Club - came together and decided that they couldn't do things on their own and collectively they could make a difference. They formed AMSC as an umbrelia club

They formed AMSC as an umbrella club and other clubs in the area realised they also couldn't do what they needed by themselves. We've now got 12 member clubs from the East Anglia region with some more clubs looking to join imminently.

Collectively we can put on some fantastic events. We organise anything from 12-car road railies to production car trials right through to this month we ran a stage raily, the Circuit Raily Championship round at Snetterton.

Things like the stage rally we'd never be able to do as individual clubs, unfortunately the numbers of people are not there within the clubs these days. So collectively we can put on things like the stage rally and even some of the bigger Targas we do. We get a lot of Interest in our events, plus

We get a lot of interest in our events, plus the StreetCar initiative that Motorsport UK has launched is really helping bolster what we're doing within the grassroots. AMSC was one of StreetCar's first approved clubs. We could see that's where the future is and if we don't get the StreetCar people in and the youngsters in there's no future in the sport.

AMSC has got a couple of specific initiatives to try and make motorsport more inclusive and accessible. We've got Better Together that has been running for quite a while now and



has really bolstered the inclusivity of the sport and that it's accessible to all.

It's off the back of Women in Grassroots Motorsport that our club development officer Laura Cooledge was involved in, which looked at female under-representation in motorsport and sought to create change, and Better Together has taken it to the next level

Better Together has taken it to the next level, Better Together has come up with a set of rules of how to relate to and treat people within motorsport. We're now looking at taking to it the next stage and working on how to push it forward.

And the other initiative we've got is Get into Motorsport that seeks to make participation in motorsport - regardless of the role or discipline - as easy as possible. While StreetCar's encouraging people to come out and drive, Get into Motorsport is encouraging all aspects of involvement, so that's also getting involved in organising and coming out to marshal. Unfortunately if we don't get more

unfortunately if we don't get more organisers in we aren't going to have the people there to run the events that people want to do. There's always going to be competitors out there, unfortunately there's not necessarily going to be organisers, so



that's AMSC's next step to really drive home the training and opportunities that are available within motorsport on the volunteering side.

We certainly encourage the use of shadowing of officials. That's how I got into clerking: I've shadowed in the past and then come through to actually clerk events myself now.

We've definitely seen a difference in participation through our work. Through Get into Motorsport we ran an initiative at the beginning of March last year and we saw people come to an evening where they never thought they'd be able to compete, they've come out with families and they've taken part in treasure hunts and all sorts of things like that which are just great to see, because there is always something for everybody within motorsport.

There's so many examples of new people participating, loads of families we've got involved, it's great to see everybody just coming out.

Winning Motorsport UK club of the year for 2022 meant so much to us. It really proves that we are going in the right direction and that the 10 years have really been worth it.

Motorsport UK knows what we do, but we never really anticipated we'd win club of the year because there's also a lot of other clubs that do great work. It's just really great to have been recognised for the initiatives we've done and the hard work that's gone in over the years and working collectively we can achieve a lot.

Winning the award has had a really good impact, and we've had other clubs come to us and say 'look what are you doing? It's obviously working' to mirror what we do to make motorsport accessible in all parts of the country.
